

OUR COLLEGE:

S. D. V. S. Sangh's S. S. Arts College and T. P. Science Institute is affiliated to Rani Channamma University, Belagavi. Our College imparts education in Humanities and Science viz. Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science. During this period UGC sponsored two add-on courses were completed viz., Certificate course in Computer Applications and Human Rights Education. A self financed Women Empowerment certificate course is under progress.

Our college stands for academic excellence to create an environment which generates curiosity of learning, habit of critical thinking and effective communication. The college aims to prepare the students with intellectual, moral and physical outlook that will make them responsible and accountable members of the society.

The gigantic building houses a spacious fully computerized bar coded library with INFLIBNET, well equipped laboratories and spacious ventilated classrooms. A lush green garden spread over 5 acres of land is serving the ecological balance of the campus. Science faculty have independent departments with internet. All the departments are provided laptop with wi-fi connection. The basic amenities like Hygienic mess & Canteen, Post office, Xerox, Pure drinking water, Career guidance bureau, Counseling and Placement cell are provided to the students satisfaction.

The teaching faculty of the Institute is a blend of experienced and youth. They are committed, dedicated and have passion to impart their knowledge for the

overall development of the students. Number of prizes, Government Freeships, Scholarships, Fee concessions and aid-funds are available to the backward and minority class students. Regular tests, examinations, orientations, teacherparent meet and mentor system helps to monitor the progress of the students. Our results are excellent and above the University average. During this period our College has bagged 3 ranks and 4 Gold medals to Rani Channamma University. During this period we have organized 10 National/ State Level Seminars/ Conferences.

Executive Summary

It is a moment of pride for SDVS sangh's S. S. Arts College and T. P. Science Institute Sankeshwar to apply for Third Cycle of Accreditation of NAAC. We were accredited at B^+ at first cycle (2004) and 'B' at second cycle (2011). Ours is a premier educational institution, which is going to celebrate its Golden Jubilee in 2017. It was established in 1967 by the philanthropists and leaders of this area to provide quality education to the rural youths. Since then it produced number of responsible citizens and creative youths. Thus it has resulted in socio-economic wellbeing of this rural area.

Our college is affiliated to RaniChannamma University, Belagavi. As a constituent college of RCU, it is imparting curricula designed by the university. Our University after bifurcation from Karnataka University, Dharawad is emerging as a center of knowledge of this region. Syllabus is framed after getting opinions and suggestions from the constituent colleges through members of Board of Studies (BOS), subject forums and educational peers. Majority of college faculty are members of Board of Examinations (BOE) and four are BOS members.

To update the changing scenario, the institution has organized Ten State/National Seminars/Conferences and Two Faculty Development Programmes (FDP) – one each for faculty and students during these four years. Our faculty has acted as Resource / Chair persons in many of the National/State level Seminars/ Workshops organized by various Institutions /Organizations.

For overall development of the institution, we obtain feedback from academic peers, students, employees and other stake holders. At present we are having seven combinations for BA programme, out of which two were added from 2014 – 15. For B.Sc it is one combination of PCM. Apart from traditional programmes the institution has undertaken and completed UGC sponsored two Add-on courses namely Computer Applications and Human Rights Education. Presently a self-financed Women Empowerment' certificate course is under progress. Karnataka State Open University (KSOU) study center is working to provide higher education for those who are employed, house-wives and rural youths of this area.

The institution is striving to bridge the gap between academic/professional/ life skills through 1) certificate courses in Computer Applications, Human Rights Education and Women Empowerment, 2) Placement Cell, student's projects and moral guest lectures by eminent personalities like Swami Tadyuktanand, Shri Ramzan Darga e.t.c. These aspects have increased our student's social concern, responsibility and self-reliance.

Our admission process is transparent. It is easily accessible to the youth of this area through college website, Prospectus, Handbooks and relayed through local cable networks during admission. University / Government norms /

guidelines are strictly followed. A special preference is given to sports students and girl students.

Learning is made student centric with the use of interactive modes like Seminars, Group discussions and Guest lectures, ICT based teaching is a added feature of our institution. At the beginning of the year Academic Calendar is prepared, accordingly activities are carried on. Feedback about staff is taken from students. It is analysed and if necessary, action is taken for improvement. Class room teaching is supplemented through Field Visits, Study tours, Community / Nature study, Industrial tours etc. Slow learners are given a special attention through personal counseling and advanced learners are encouraged to lead college activities.

At the beginning of the year various committees are formed to facilitate smooth and effective teaching, learning and evaluative process. Academic activities are carried on in accordance with academic calendar of the Parent University. Internal tests, assignments and attendance of the students are conducted in accordance with University norms. At the same time institute prepares its academic calendar. Curricular and co-curricular activities are planned and implemented accordingly. IQAC and steering committee supervises all these activities.

Our institute accommodates and educates rural students of this region. At present 481 students are studying in our institution, out of which 273 are girl students i.e. 57%. Modern teaching aids are used to facilitate teaching – learning process. These facilities are created for the benefit of socio-economically weaker students. Majority of our students are economically weak and belongs to rural and backward area. So, various financial aids, scholarships and welfare measures are provided to them. Sincere effort is made to reduce the drop out percentage. Every year college magazine, hand book and prospectus are published for the benefit of the students.

Examination process and Evaluation method of the University is communicated to the students at the beginning of the year. Internal tests are conducted as per the University norms and "assessed papers" are shown to the students. Students are advised to attempt the papers as per the requirement of semester examinations. If any student is not happy with his/her result in a particular subject, he/she is assisted to go for revaluation/rechecking. The parent University maintains transparency through bar coding and central evaluation. These activities help the students for their overall academic development.

We have a blend of experienced, highly qualified and young faculty. 12 regularly appointed and 22 management appointees are the torch bearers of the education in this region. 07 of them are Ph.D holders, 07 M.Phil. holders, 06 NET/SLET qualified and 05 of them are pursuing their Ph.D. Our faculty has brought laurels to the institute by being Resource/Chair persons at various International/National/State level Seminars/Conferences. 02 faculty members

have received National awards, where as one has received State award during this period. Majority of the faculty members have presented papers at various International/National/ State level Seminars/Conferences. We are proud of our team for successfully organizing 10 National/State level Seminars / Conferences during this assessment period.

Even though our college is not a recognized research centre, one of our faculty is a research guide. Institution gives priority to research and extension activities. The research committee monitors it. During this period 30 plus

student research projects have been undertaken and completed. Our faculty have taken up and completed five minor research projects during the period.

Our faculty is involved in free consultancy service in the area of Career guidance, placement, self-employment, higher education, Poultry, Kuvempu studies, Human rights, Right to information, Training in practical's for primary education teachers, Community service etc. It has helped 27 students to get campus selection, 60 plus students have joined defence services, around 25 students have taken up self-employment and nearly 130 students have joined higher education. Our community based outreach activities have created awareness among the rural mass regarding health, hygiene, government schemes and plans. NSS/NCC/YRC have organized extension activities in the nearby villages to create awareness about Dengue, Malaria, Water harvesting, Organic farming, Environment etc. Awareness is created in the locality regarding voting, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Crackers free Ganesh Festival, Colour free and POP free Ganesh idols.

The college is located in a specious campus of 10 acres land. We have adequate infrastructure to accommodate administrative, curricular and cocurricular programmes. The main building of the college is double storied with 6529.51Sq.mtr of built-up area having 12 spacious class rooms out of which 6 are ICT based, spacious office and Principal chamber, 450 Sq.mtr's of library, 700 Sq.mtr's of separate laboratories, 150 sitting capacity auditorium, staff room, Ladies room, Computer laboratory, Open air theatre and multy Gym with 16 stations. UGC assisted laboratory construction work is under progress. We have a separate Library block with around 34000 volumes, 25 periodicals and journals and 8 Dailies supported by OPAC search, bar-coding and INFLIBNET. Departmental libraries, book bank, internet and reprographic facilities are available in the college. All these are safe-guarded through CC TV.

Under X plan UGC assistance women's hostel is constructed which accommodates 42 students and the boy's hostel accommodates 60 students. Hygienic mess and canteen feeds the students and faculty in the campus. Routine requirements like Xerox, vehicle stand, internet, post office, pure drinking water and temporary health centre are available in the campus for students and faculty. 30 computers with internet fulfill the technological need of the campus. The campus has Taluka stadium with 400 mtr's standard track, supported by Courts and play ground. UGC assisted Basket-Ball Court construction is under progress. Separate rooms are provided for NSS/NCC activities.

The main building is naturally ventilated. During day time supply of electricity is rarely required. To support the shortage of electricity 25 Kv silent Genset Generator is installed. For water supply a open well and 02 tube wells are there. Further town municipal corporation has provided 24 hours water supply.

Friendly and harmonious relations among the students is a special feature. On account of this ragging and sexual harassment is not reported. Ladies forum, grievance redressal cell, anti-ragging cell, NSS/NCC and the discipline committee monitors all these things. College supports participation of students in extracurricular activities, sports and games. During this period our college has produced 03 ranks and 04 gold medalists in B.A. programme to RCU. Our students have won prizes at State/University level and inter-collegiate competitions. Our athletes have bagged medals at University level sports meets. Our students have presented papers and won prizes in National/State level Seminars/Conferences.

We have an active alumni association which meets at least twice in a year. Some alumni's have occupied prominent positions in socio- economicpolitical sector. Some of them are progressive cultivators of this region. During this period alumni association has collaborated with IQAC for organizing a workshop. Alumni association is consulted before making important academic and administrative decisions. Thus the student community is respected and honoured.

Vision, Mission and Goals are in tune with National higher education policy and NAAC core issues. The curricular and co-curricular activities are planned and implemented according to Vision, Mission and Goals.

The Board of Management of SDVS Sangh is a supreme authority for dicision making. The institute follows the rules and guidelines framed by the Sangh from time to time. At the same time UGC, State government and University rules, guidelines and directions are promptly followed. The academic and administrative policies are planned and implemented accordingly. The Principal is the executive head of the college who carries on day today activities with the support of IQAC, various committees, teaching and non-teaching staff. The service conditions are governed by government and Sangh's rules.

The college website (www.sstpsnk.edu.in) is used for academic and administrative purposes

Decentralized administrative set-up is followed in the college. A three-tire administrative system viz. the board of management at the top, the local governing body as a supervisory team and the Principal is the chief executive head. This process always tries to maintain transparency in administration and cordial relationships. The local governing body meets periodically to supervise effective implementation of decisions and to review curricular and co-curricular activities. Various committees formed in the beginning of the year to assist the Principal to carry on the day today activities of the college. Financial transparency and good accounting system is maintained in the college. The receipts and payments of the college are audited by a registered Chartered Accountant.

The institution readily supports teaching and non-teaching staffs to update their knowledge in their area. Incentives and necessary support is provided to the faculty for innovative practices, programmes and organizing Seminars and Workshops. Employee's cooperative credit society (Bharat teacher's cooperative credit society) gives loans to staff at concessional rates. The faculty members and the students are felicitated for their extra ordinary achievements on special occasions.

IQAC monitors and guides curricular and co-curricular activities of the institution. It is actively functioning since 2004 - 05. During 2015-16 in collaboration with Alumni Association, IQAC has organized a workshop on preparing a re-accreditation report for III cycle. IQAC assists the Principal in preparing the academic calendar and action plans of the college. It is actively involved in all the activities of the college. In its periodical meetings it prepares the action plans and reviews the activities that have taken place.

Though ours is the co-education institute, girl students are majority in number i.e 57%. College is making sincere efforts to provide inclusive education to the students belonging to SC/ST/OBC, female and other neglected sections of the society. Socially and economically weaker students are provided scholarships and free ships.

Cordial relations with different stake holders like students, alumni, parents and the general public are maintained. Thus we are trying to educate the students and public of this area.

Examination committee looks after grievances related to evaluation. Whenever the problems arises, students approach the committee, and examination committee takes the necessary steps to resolve the problems.


2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes



- Special leave is granted for the faculty to attend State/National/International seminars and workshops. Time table is prepared to suit their requirements and they were relived from major extra curricular activities.
- The facilities available in the institute are provided for research work such as Wi-Fi, /Internet and INFLIBNET etc.
- The accounts of minor research projects are audited by a Chartered Accountant which is submitted to UGC along with utilization certificate.
- Student's projects are special features of our institution. Every year various departments of the institute assign projects to the student's on burning and relevant topics. Group of students are guided by a faculty in this task.

- **Library:** Specious library with nearly 34000 odd volumes with INFLIBNET facility, OPAC search point, new arrivals display, audio visual facility, ICT facility, 8 dailies, 25 periodicals and journals with special room.
- **Gymkhana:** 400 mt's standard track, multi gym facility, facilities for indoor games, Volleyball court, tenni-coit court, cricket ground, football ground, shortly basket ball court will be constructed with UGC assistance. We have the equipments for almost all games and sports.
- **Gymnasium:** Multi gym with 16 stations.
- **Hostel:** A separate boy's hostel with 60 intake capacity and separate women hostel with 42 intake capacity with hygienic kitchen and pure drinking water facility.
- Auditorium: Well equipped auditorium with 150 sitting capacity.
- **Recreation:** Recreation hall, common staff room with sanitation, departmental staff rooms for science faculty.
- Laboratories:

Physics Lab: Well equipped Physics lab with micro wave bench, Ultrasonic velocity instrument and temperature controlled furnace, GM counters, Hall Effect equipment, fore probe equipment, LCR meter and electronic weighing machine etc.

Chemistry Lab: Well equipped Chemistry lab with Spectro photo meter, Abbe's refracto meter, distillation unit, water and soil analysis kit with Rare chemicals.

• Back Up: 25 KV silent genset generator.

- **Drinking water:** Pure drinking water with 3 aqua guards located at two places.
- **Sanitation:** Adequate sanitation facility is provided both for boys and girls.
- Others: Canteen, Reprography machine, CC cameras, Post office, independent rooms for NCC, NSS, YRC and other cells, visitors lounge, parking facility. All these things are surrounded by beautiful lush green garden.



 - Grievance Redressal unit: A senior faculty member is in charge of Grievance Redressalcell. Student representatives are also part of it.
 - Women's Cell: An active ladies forum looks after the women's cell. It organizes activities related to women empowerment. A certificate course on women empowerment is under progress.
 - Counseling Cell and Career Guidance: It conducts guest lectures on carrier and placements. Students are deputed for campus interview. A campus drive was organized by the cell.
 - **Placement Unit** -: The placement cell works in coordination with counseling and carrier guidance cell. During these four years 27 students have been successfully placed at various companies.
 - **Canteen:**A Canteen is there on the campus and one in ladies hostel.
 - **Recreational spaces for staff and students:** Common room for staff, auditorium and hostels for students.
 - Safe drinking water facility: Provided at two places on the campus and in both the hostels. One of the aqua guard unit is established with the financial support of alumni.
 - Auditorium: A auditorium with 150 sitting capacity.
 - SC STcell: Active SC /ST cell is there which attends the grievances and problems of the students.
 - NCC: A company with 90 cadets.
 - **NSS:** One unit of 100 strength
 - **Red cross Unit:** For the last three years Red Cross unit is active.
 - Antiraging Cell: Cell is there but no serious cases are reported.

A separate room is provided for Newspapers/Magazines/Question papers where in audio – visual provision is also made. Paper clipping service and display of new arrivals is made throughout the year. Under UGC book bank scheme, a set of optional books are issued to almost all students for the academic year.



Post Accreditation initiatives

(Journey from II cycle III cycle NAAC Accreditation)

On 17th and 18th February 2011 NAAC peer team visited our college for II cycle of accreditation and accredited at B level (2-43). Valuable suggestions and observations were made by them. It has identified certain strength and weaknesses after critical assessment. The institute has made sincere and honest efforts to implement the recommendations soon after the accreditation.

Recommendations of previous peer team

- To start a good English language laboratory with experienced faculty for augmenting communication skills
- To fully computerize library with INFLIBNET or DELNET facility.
- To motivate all faculty members to cultivate research culture and apply for more funded research projects.
- To strengthen placement cell for better student progression through campus interviews.
- To start some interdisciplinary UG/PG courses, relevant add-on programs, skill based courses, gender sensitization courses and coaching for competitive examinations.
- To strive for procuring a few MoUs with industries and other organizations around to enhance job potential of students.
- Use of ICT to be more prevalent.
- New class rooms, faculty cabins, common rooms, auditorium etc. to be provided.

Initiations taken:

IQAC of our Institute is working actively in co-ordination with staff and various committees. It has organized a workshop on Reaccreditation process under the sponsorship of Alumni. All the college activities are smoothly carried out in consultation with IQAC. It has organized 10 seminars/workshops during this period. This year the college has applied for 8 seminars for which UGC approval is awaited. Naturally college quality is increased and resulted in increase of student's strength and ranks to University.

During last accreditation we were lagging in INFLIBNET accessibility. Now we are members already. Library is computerized and bar coded with OPAC search point. New arrivals are displayed throughout the year with paper clippings. During this period 2655 volumes of around `.4.5 lakhs were added.

Peer team suggested faculty to go for research and project works. During the accreditation period five Minor Research Projects have been undertaken and

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completed under UGC sponsorship. Further to develop research culture among the students, 30+ research projects have been completed on interdisciplinary topics. This is only because of BOM interest. Five of our faculty have registered for Ph.D.

Our placement cell has arranged guest lectures by eminent personalities to develop leadership qualities and overall development of students to meet the challenges and global competitiveness. Placement cell deputed our students to campus drives organized by neighboring Institutes and 27 students succeeded in getting better placements

Two Add-on-courses have been completed in this period viz "Computer Applications" and "Human Right Education". Self funded "Women Empowerment" is under progress. The strength of girl students is more in number. The certificate course aims at Empowering the girl students.

Special guest lectures organized on interdisciplinary nature topics, skill based courses, Gender sensitization and counseling is also done for competitive examinations.

Our Institute situated in rural and backward border area, wherein industries are mergre. Hence little effort is made to make MOU with neighboring Institute like S.S.N. College, Hukkeri, R. L. Law College, Belagavi and Government Hospital, Sankeshwar.

Six class rooms updated to ICT technology through which advanced level student centered teaching is imparted. It is reflected in our examination results. To maintain discipline and order in the Institute CCTV is installed. An auditorium with a sitting capacity of 150 is provided. Every department is provided a laptop with wifi facility. Under UGC XII plan assistance, new class rooms have been constructed and laboratories construction work is under progress. The construction of Women's Hostel is completed and we are planning for its extension. Basket ball court with UGC assistance will be constructed soon.
